<u>Day 1</u>: If you could describe God in your mind, what leaning would your words take, a negative or a positive slant? Can you envision a loving God? In your upbringing, did your family, peers, associates shape or sway your understanding of God? In what ways?

<u>Day 2</u>: Make an ongoing list using the letters of the alphabet to detail the characteristics of God (i.e. Aô Almighty; Bô blameless...). In what ways do your descriptions give evidence to the significance of God in your life personally? (i.e. How has He revealed His might to you? Is He truly blameless?)

Where do these Biblical traits fit into your log? Rewrite each in your own words. Are you surprised at what you read?

<u>Day 6</u>: Are all gods the same? How is the God of the Bible different? How would you explain Jehovah God to a truly inquisitive person?

<u>Day 8</u>: Using a thesaurus or dictionary, do a study on the word *omnipotent*. How all-powerful do you believe God truly is? How often do you reflect on His might? Is there anything He *cannot* do? If yes, what? In what ways has God shown His power to you?

<u>Day 10</u>: Do a word study of *omnipresent*. Is it unnerving to know that you are never truly alone, that your private thoughts are not secret? If you operated on the conviction that God was watching at all times, would there be a majorô noticeable?ô change in your daily activities? Explain your answer.

<u>Day 12</u>: Complete a study for the word *omniscient*. Then read Isaiah 55:8-9. If God doesnøt think like man, how can someone presume to understand what He is doing? Do you sometimes feel His guidance may be a little skewed? (i.e. What? The dealøs off! But Iøve already sold my house, bought the plane tickets, boxed up my office!) What do you do in situations like these? How can He be loving and wise and allow such confusion?

<u>Day 15</u>: Read 1 Chronicles 29:11-12. Do a word story on *control*. If God is indeed the head over everything, does that include all governments, good or bad? How can a loving God allow evil men to reign, in families or in regimes?

Summarize these verses. Do you like what you read? Do they defuse any confusion or bitterness you might harbor?
